Historical and General Information

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General Description

The Institution Founded in 1889 by Presbyterians, the University of Pikeville is comprised of the College of Arts and Sciences (CAS) [which includes the Patton College of Education], the Coleman College of Business (CCOB), the College of Nursing and Human Services (CNHS) [which includes the Elliott School of Nursing and the School of Social Work], the Kentucky College of Optometry (KYCO), and the Kentucky College of Osteopathic Medicine (KYCOM). In addition to awarding undergraduate degrees that include foundations of broad liberal arts and sciences education, both undergraduate and graduate (master's) degrees provide opportunities for students to develop to their full academic and personal potentials while preparing for specific careers. KYCO develops leaders in therapeutic optometry through innovative education and a commitment to caring for the underserved. KYCOM provides its men and women with an osteopathic medical education that emphasizes primary care, encourages research, promotes lifelong scholarly activity and a commitment to serving the healthcare needs of communities in rural Kentucky and other Appalachian regions.

Location The University of Pikeville is located on approximately 25 acres in the city of Pikeville, a vibrant community in East Kentucky. Pikeville is one of the state's leading financial centers and has been ranked as one of the "100 Best Small Towns" in America.

Academic Programs Students may choose, at the undergraduate level, from nine certificate programs, four associate degree programs and 30 baccalaureate degree programs; and at the graduate level, two post-baccalaureate certificate programs; three master's programs, and two professional programs.

Faculty Almost three-fourths (72 percent) of the 60 full-time undergraduate faculty members hold terminal degrees and the student-to-faculty ratio is 14.4:1. All 17 full-time optometry school and all 28 full-time medical school faculty have terminal degrees.

Students UPIKE has grown to encompass six colleges that offer associate, bachelor, masters, and doctoral degree programs to more than 2,600 students from 47 states/territories and 24 countries including approximately 1,575 undergraduates, 200 master's students, and 825 professional doctoral students

Financial Aid Almost all incoming freshmen (99 percent) and almost all (99 percent) of the full-time degree-seeking undergraduate students receive some form of financial assistance to cover the cost of attendance (e.g., scholarships, grants, work-study, and/or loans).

History of the University of Pikeville

The University of Pikeville was established in 1889 as an outreach of the Presbyterian Church after an extensive survey of the religious and educational needs of Eastern Kentucky. An 1887 scouting party, which included Dr. W. C. Condit, Rev. Samuel B. Alderson and Rev. James P. Hendrick, set forth, in Condit's words, to "select the location for an institution of higher learning for the youth of the mountains."

September 16, 1889, was the first day of class at Pikeville Collegiate Institute, located in a four-room brick building situated on three acres of land in Pikeville, KY. It functioned as both school and church. The institute was not originally intended to confer degrees, but to give "good practical education to those persons who pursue its courses." At that time, the institute offered schoolwork in primary, preparatory and "college" departments.

In 1909, the structure of the school changed and the articles of incorporation were amended to make Pikeville College a chartered college, empowered by the state of Kentucky to offer four years of college work and confer baccalaureate degrees. The school maintained its commitment to primary and secondary education in the region by sustaining the Pikeville Collegiate Academy for grades 1-12. Pikeville College admitted its first college freshman class in 1916. The final two years of college were added in 1955, and the first baccalaureate graduation was held in 1957, a year that also marked the closing of the Pikeville Collegiate Academy.

Pikeville College School of Osteopathic Medicine opened its doors on Sept. 8, 1997, as the 19th osteopathic medical school in the country. The school was the dream of Paintsville attorney G. Chad Perry III, a visionary whose generosity and perseverance paved the way for a new generation of doctors to provide primary care in medically underserved areas in Eastern Kentucky and Appalachia. On May 12, 2001, these medical students were the first at Pikeville College to receive the doctor of osteopathic medicine (D.O.) degree.

Effective August 1, 2010, the University of Pikeville campus became completely tobacco-free. The Pikeville College Board of Trustees authorized creation of the institution's first master's degree program, a Master of Business Administration (MBA), in February 2011. At that time, the board acknowledged that the college, by definition of the programs it offered, was a university. On July 1, 2011, Pikeville College officially became the University of Pikeville, also known as UPIKE.

The Coal Building, a \$34 million educational facility housing the Kentucky College of Osteopathic Medicine, opened in fall 2012. As part of the plan for growth, the University was reorganized in fall 2013 into three colleges - the College of Arts and Sciences, the Coleman College of Business, and the Kentucky College of Osteopathic Medicine (KYCOM).

The Kentucky College of Optometry (KYCO) enrolled its first class on Aug. 1, 2016, as the 22nd school in the country to have a college of optometry. The Health Professions Education Building a facility that houses KYCO, opened in March 2017. The Kentucky College of Optometry is the fourth college under the University of Pikeville banner and reflects the institution's mission of service and strategic initiatives.

The University of Pikeville's Elliott School of Nursing opened a newly renovated skills and simulation labs, which were funded by a private donor, August 23, 2021. The up-to-date skills lab provides hands-on learning opportunities allowing simulated patients to teach the students the skills needed in the field, along with a hospital-like setting that creates an environment much like what the students will experience in their careers.

In spring 2022, the Tanner College of Dental Medicine was made possible by the generosity of the philanthropic Tanner family. The family, has blessed the University of Pikeville with a transformative \$25 million gift that is not only the largest single gift ever received by the university but the largest donation on record to any Kentucky college. The Appalachian News Express (ANE) building, which housed the newspaper offices and its printing presses, will be home to the college, which plans to begin accepting students in 2025.

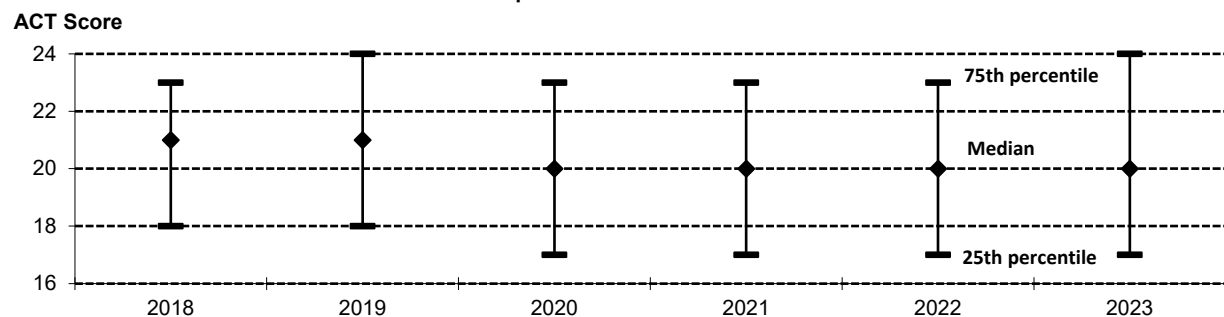

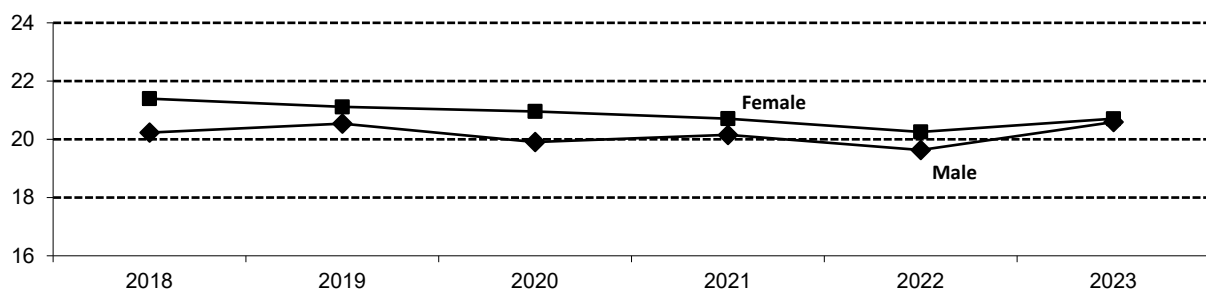

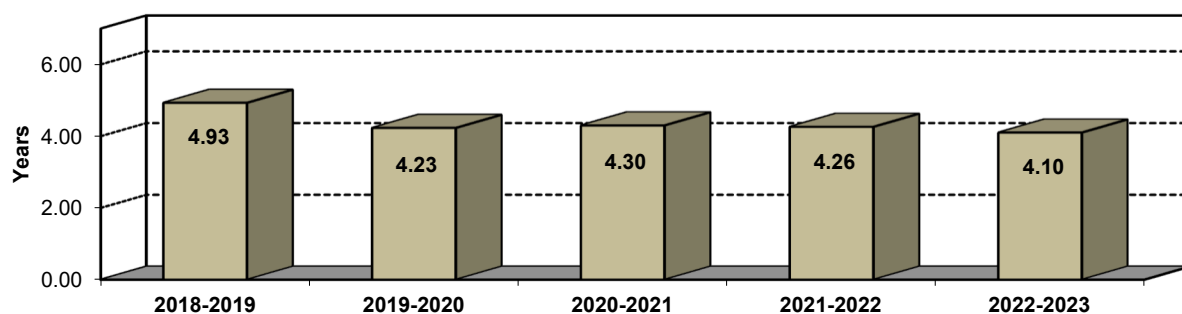

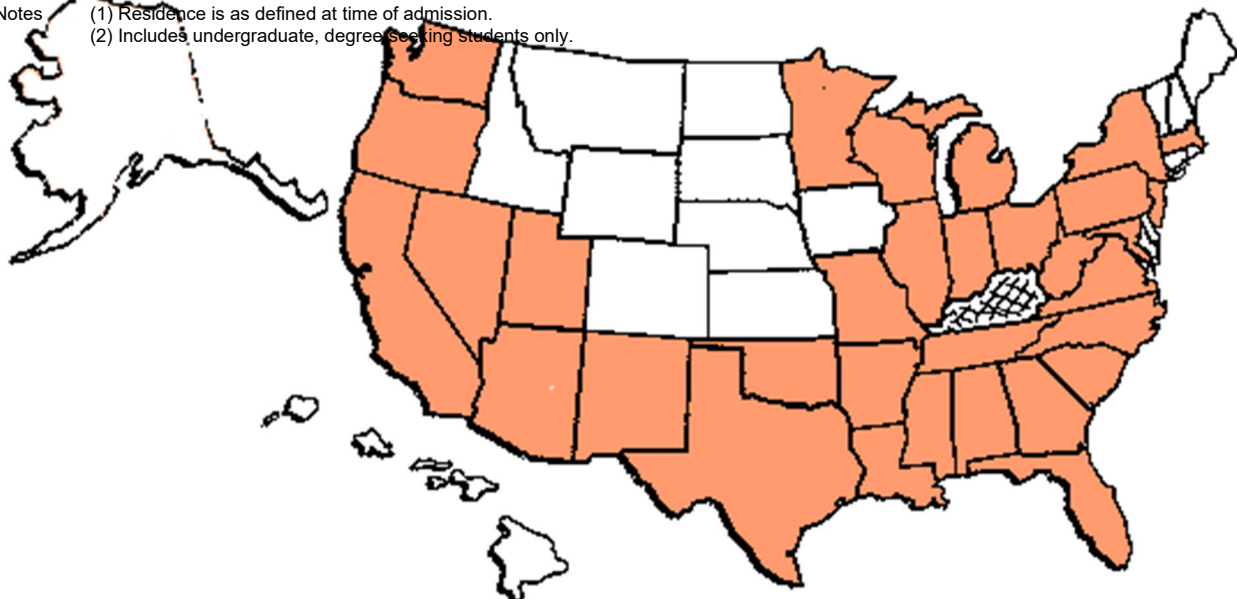

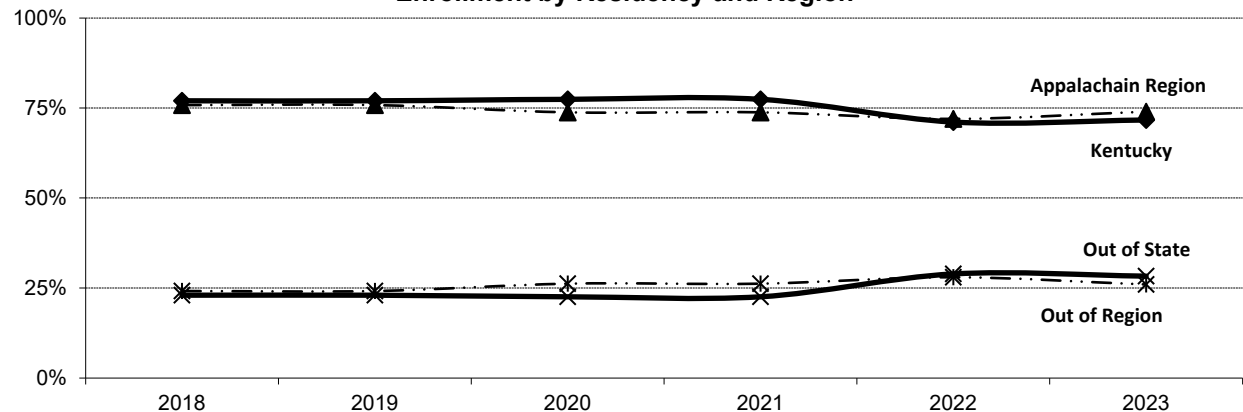

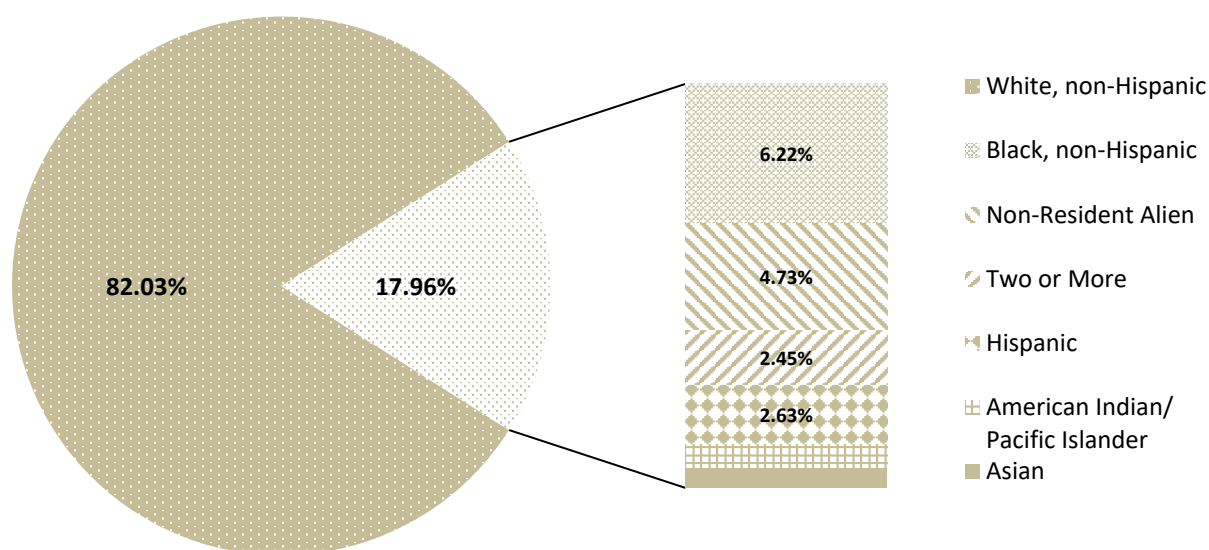

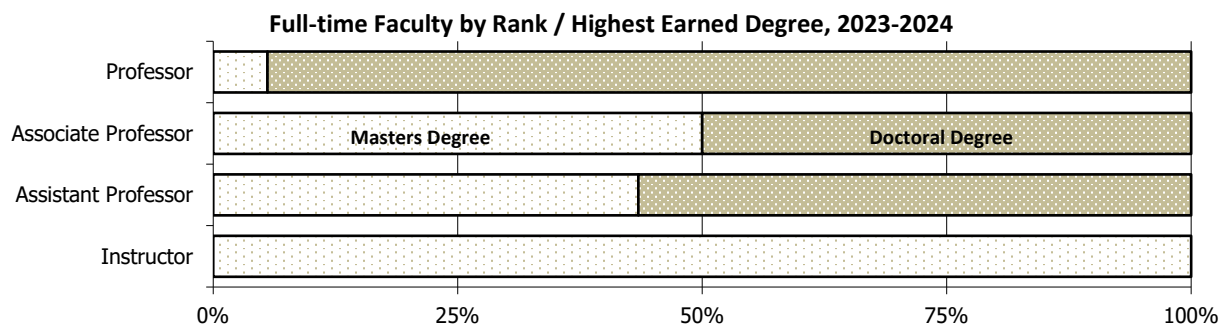

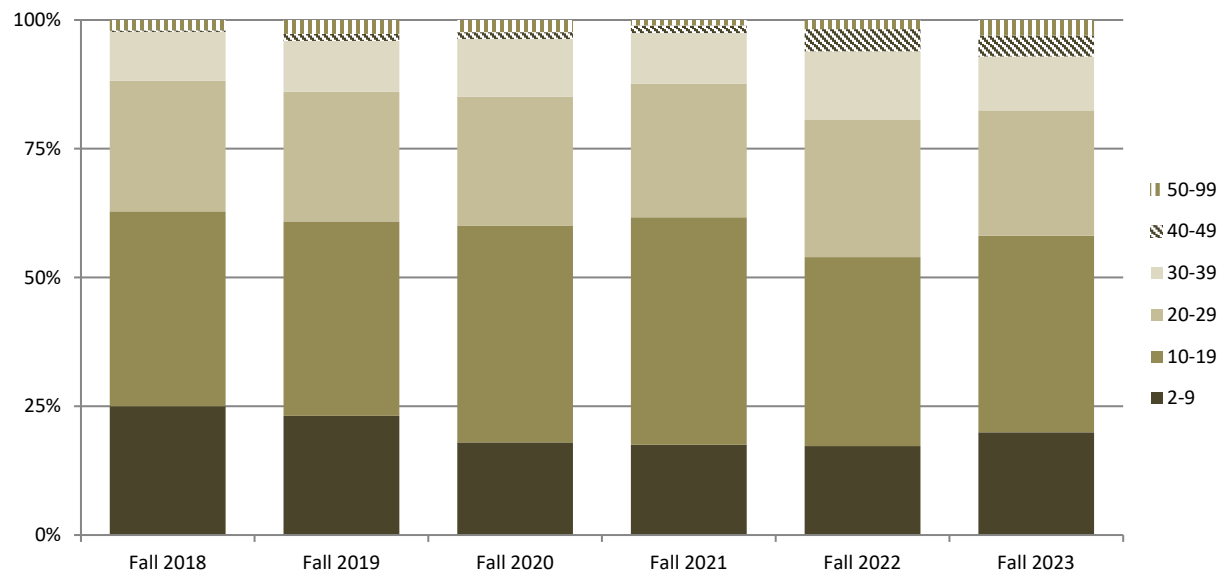

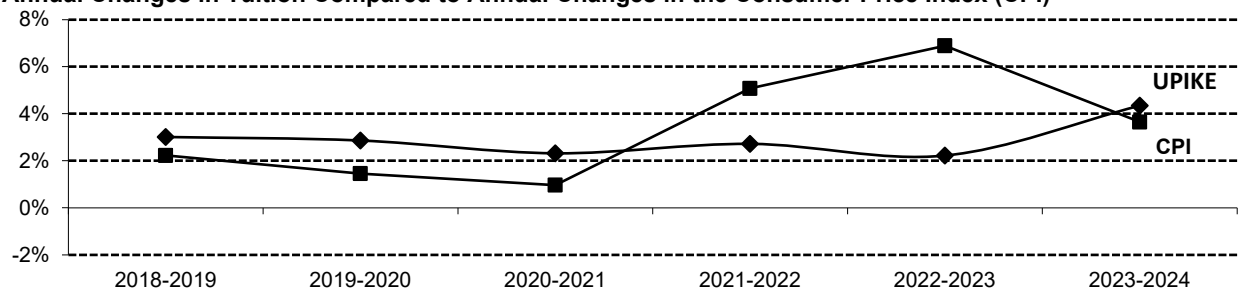

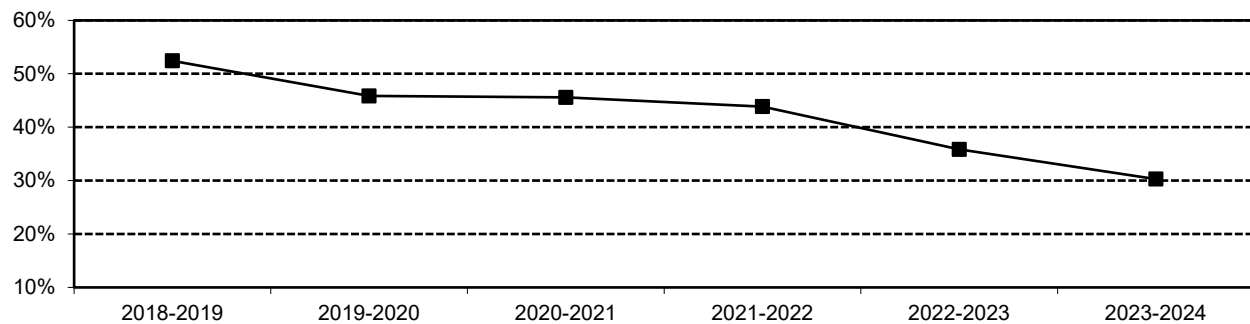

Annual Changes in Tuition Compared to Annual Changes in the Consumer Price Index (CPI)

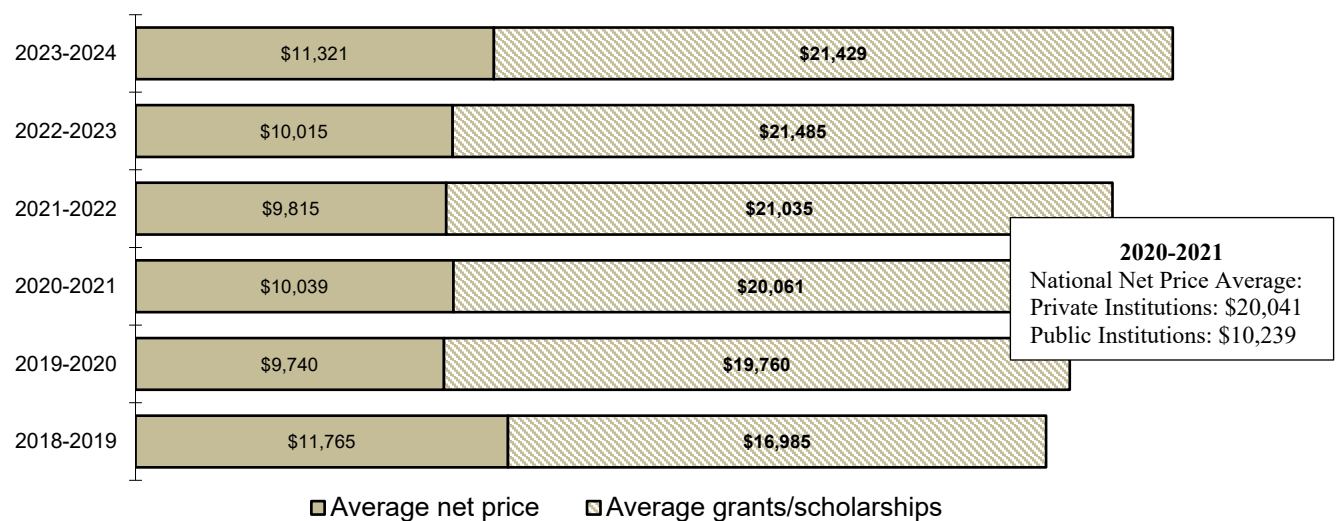

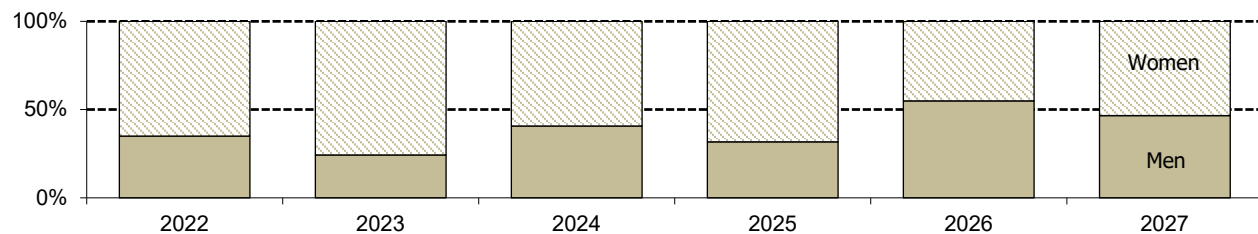

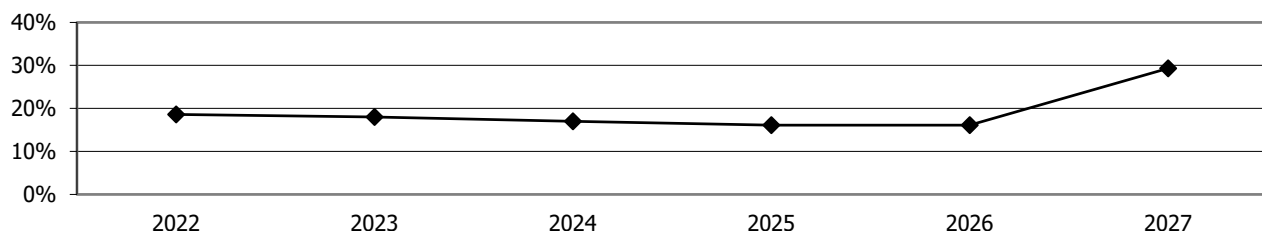

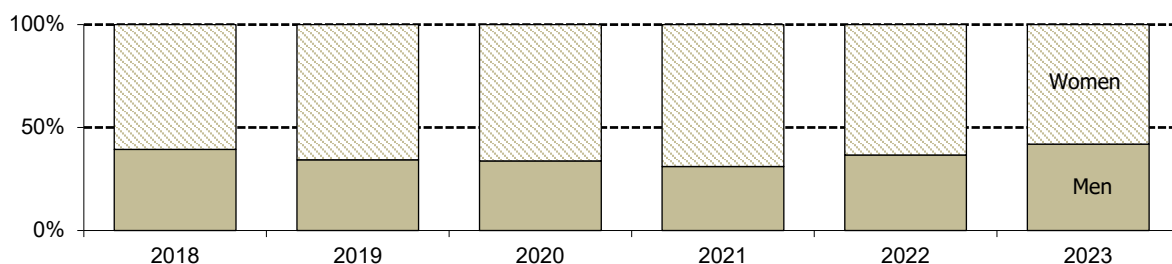

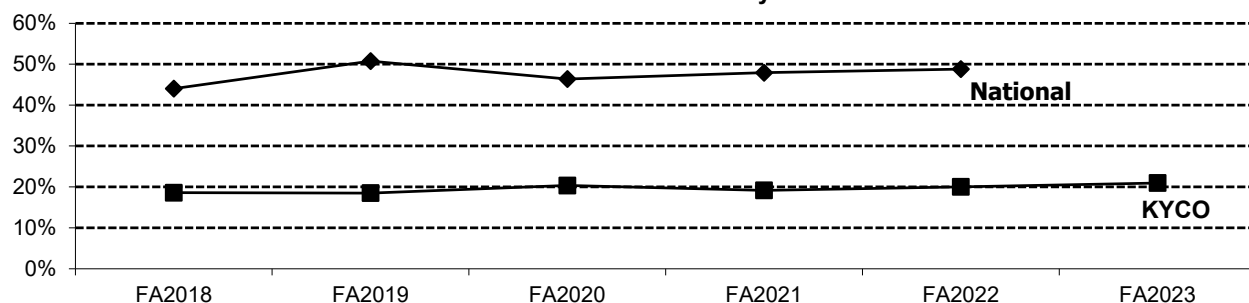

Total Enrollment Ethnic Minority Trends



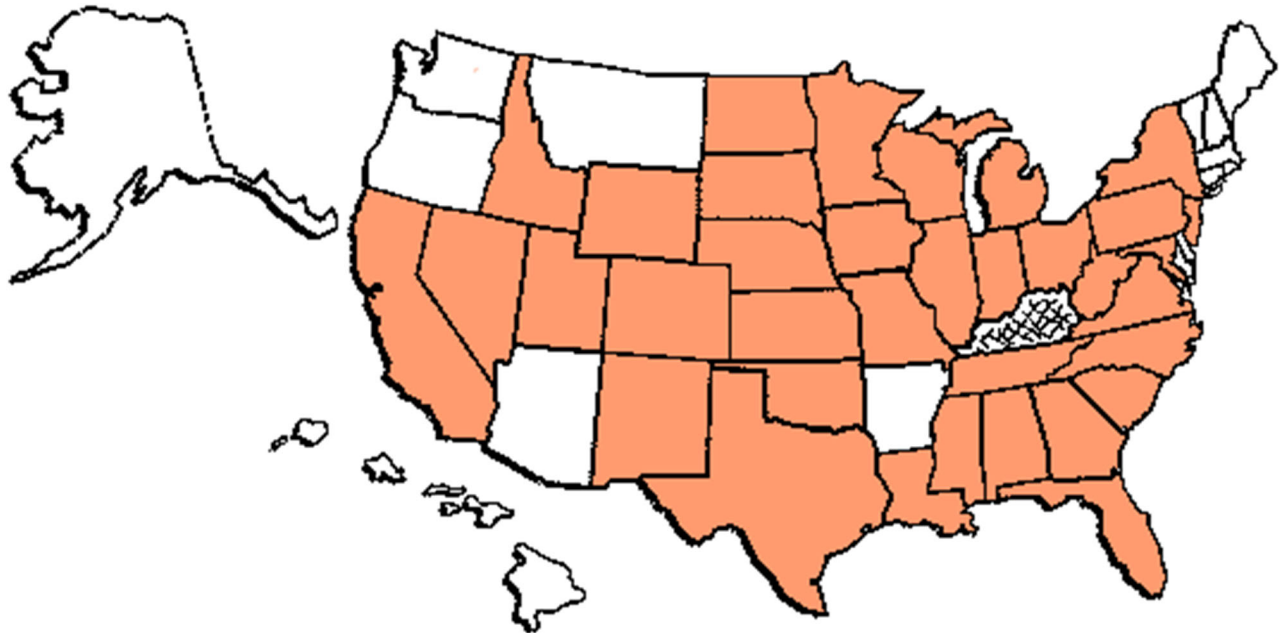

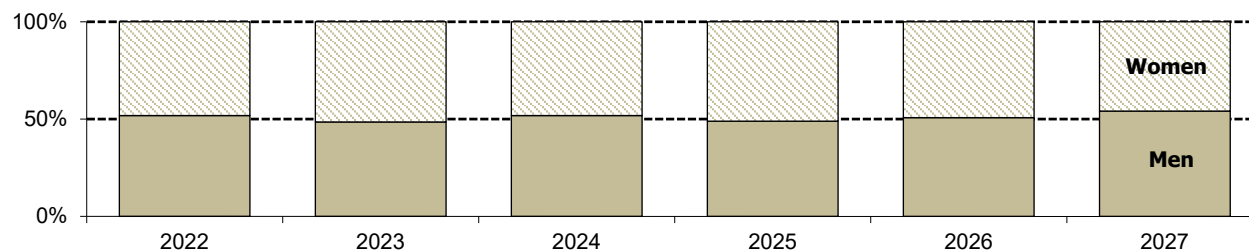

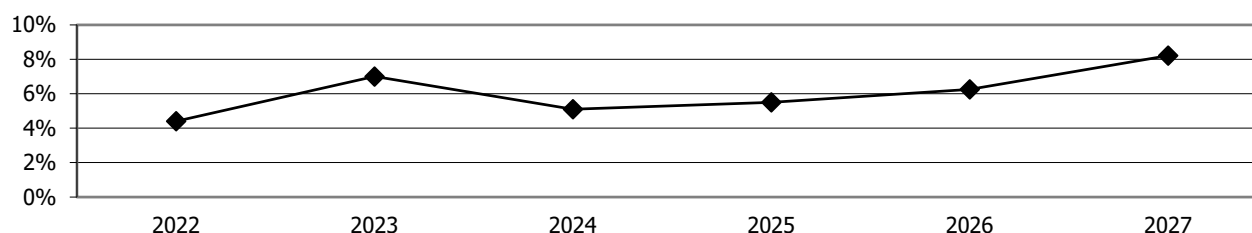

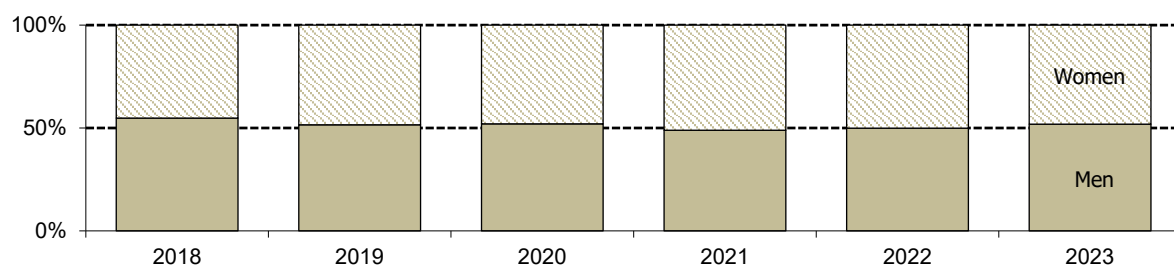

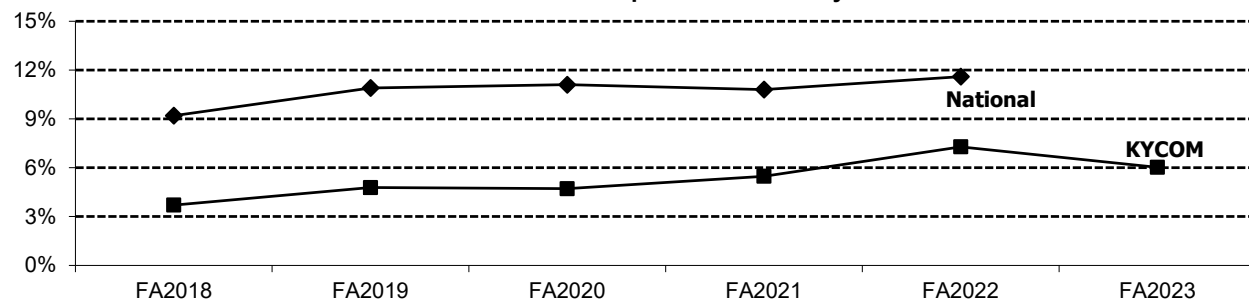

Total Enrollment Under-Represented Minority Trends



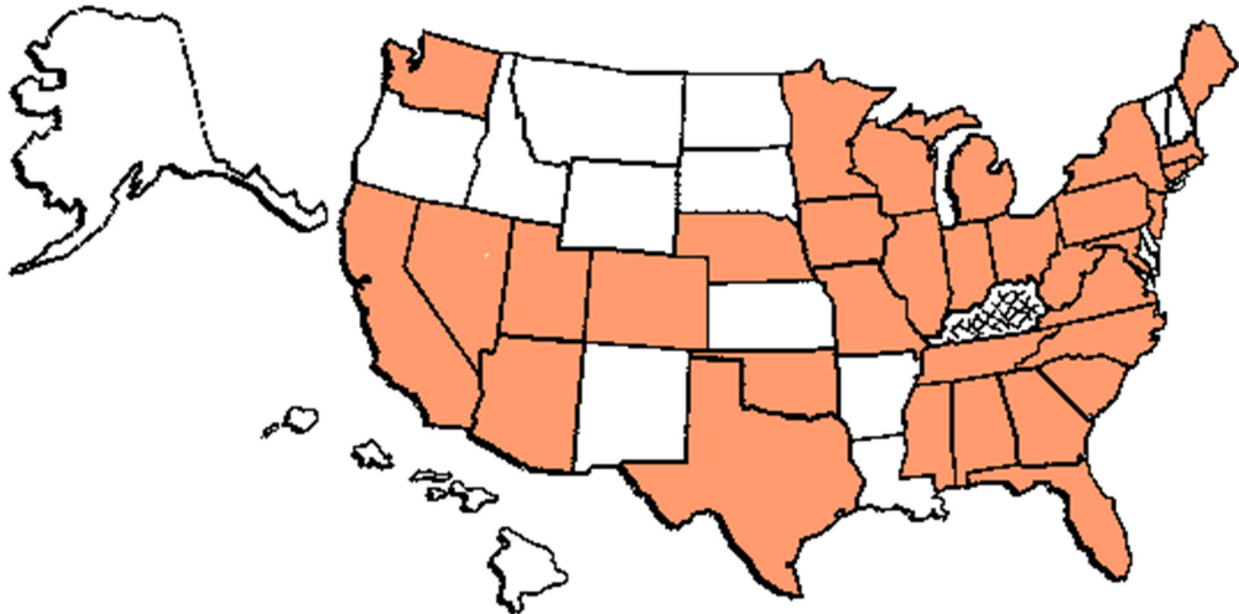

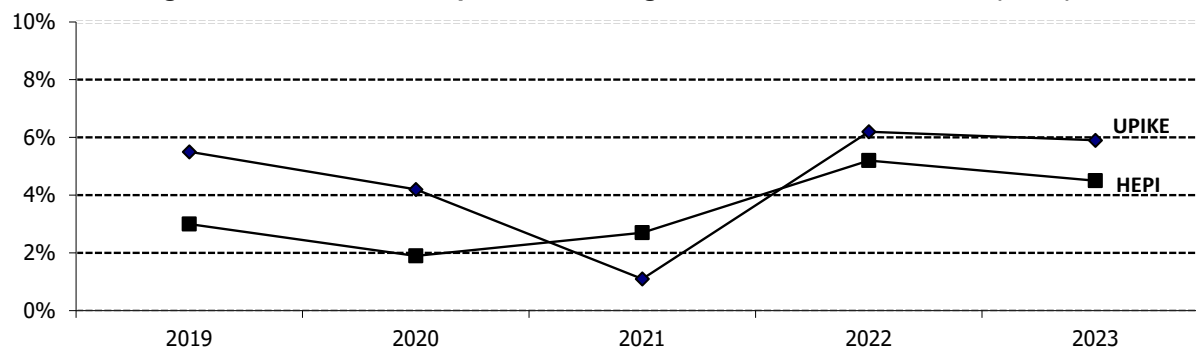

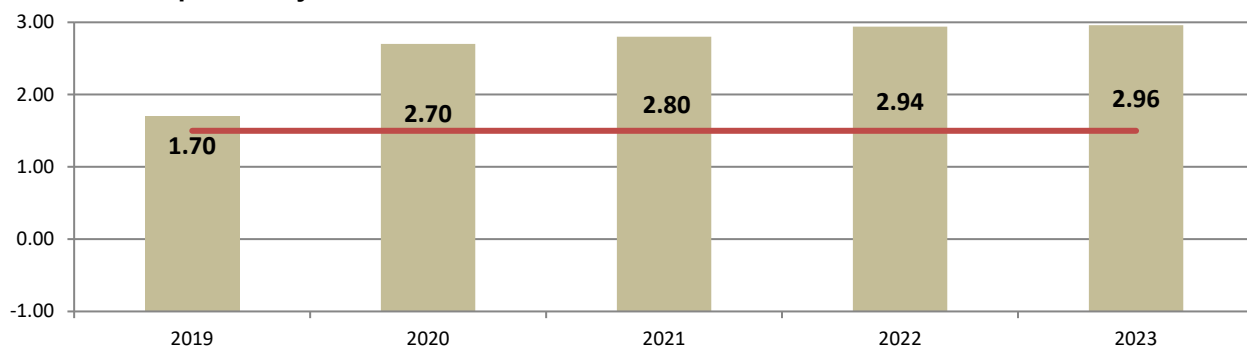
